We'll hear from the Land Conservancy of SLO County about the funding status for the Toro Coast Preserve (it's a happy report!) and what the next steps are. Summary news: Phase 1 (of 3 phases) is fully funded and Phase 2 along Alva Paul Creek is over 90% complete. We are GOING to create a regional park right on the bluffs above North Morro Bay.

Toro Coast Preserve

The Toro Coast Preserve (TCP) is moving along nicely! This is just a really quick update and members will hear more at the Annual Meeting. The key thing is that we now understand the need to fundraise to be able to close the deal for Phase 2 along Alva Paul Creek: the big chunks of money (\$5 million of it) are conditional on the local community being able to raise the final \$500,000 needed. We have to get to work.

A quick background. The TCP started seven years ago when we learned that Chevron wanted to sell the large plot it owned along Toro Creek and up on top of the bluffs. They used a tank farm and pumping operation to support their onand off-loading of oil and products to tankers in Estero Bay.

We divided the project into 3 phases, as shown in the map. The reddish-tan parcel north of Toro Creek is fully funded. Now we are working to finish getting the money needed to purchase the lime green parcel along Alva Paul Creek in Phase 2. The blue parcel will be done by 2030 if all goes well.

The future of these 3 parcels could be a new regional park operated by the SLO County parks department—they have agreed to this plan if we can buy the land. Imagine trails, camping, safer access to dog beach and more in this public park. And the land would be part of a permanent land conservation so it would always be there as a park, nothing else.



Please give generously as you can. Our lead agency, the Land Conservancy of SLO County, is aiming to close in summer 2024 so we have very little time. Bringing Beavers Back to Morro Bay Watershed?

Watch for an agenda and event details including in-person and virtual registration links coming soon. This free event will give you the detail on why beavers' environmental services are so important for the Morro Bay watershed and how we can live side-by-side with them to our mutual benefit.

The next day, May 19, the Beaver Brigade will be leading tours out to the beaver habitat on the Salinas River in Atascadero so you can see with your own eyes the habitat that the beavers can create.

SLO Beaver Brigade, MBOSA and the Cal Poly Initiative for Climate Leadership and Resilience have a vested interest in the health and longevity of the Morro Bay watershed. Morro Bay estuary is a unique and beautiful center for biodiversity where we have the opportunity to feel the peace and balance of the natural world.

There are objective environmental benefits too. Healthy estuary and watershed ecosystems facilitate more carbon sequestration and resilience to climate change.



A thriving beaver population will expand wetlands along creeks to promote amazing diversity of plants and animals as well as begin to recharge groundwater. These benefits have been demonstrated in many places where beavers have been reintroduced—it is not a pipe dream.

Beavers are native to the creeks that flow into Morro Bay, but they were hunted completely out of the area well over 100 years ago. The Bringing Back Beavers program will show how re-introducing beavers can begin to undo the environmental damage done by this hunting.

This program is part of a broader effort led by the Beaver Brigade and its supporters to make people aware of what benefits beavers can bring and how we can go about bringing them back to the creeks. The program will include presentations, small group breakout sessions and interactive discussions where people who live near the estuary and Cal Poly students as well can get realistic answers on what it looks like to coexist with beavers and how to facilitate restoration projects.

Field Trip Summary, May 2023-April 2024

MBOSA members took advantage of 3 different field trips within the last year. In June and July Mimi Kimball led trips at Estero Bluffs from the Fig Tree parking lot to the grinding stones to the south. Mimi gave a history of the area, showed many artifacts, identified many of the plant species along the path and talked about the geology of the bluffs as well as showed us the rocks with their grinding holes from Native American use in the past. Both trips were well received and the weather was beautiful!



In November members went to view the beaver dams on the Salinas River in Atascadero. Cooper Lienhart led the walk and discussed history of the beavers in the area, what they eat and how they work to make the ponds behind the dams. We saw 2 newly finished dams and lots of evidence of beavers working along the riverbanks, but no beavers. Seems they like to work in private!

In December, taking advantage of the very low tides, members visited the beaches and rocks in Cayucos, looking for live organisms as well as beach debris full of shells and dried materials. Again the day was very nice, the tide very low and the company very interesting. The walk culminated with kelp cake as a treat.

More trips are being planned for this year, so stay tuned!
